

As both a president and a longtime member, my goal has always been to inspire others to join us in our mission, leaving a lasting legacy of service, camaraderie, and community empowerment.



About the Queen Contest

The Miss Woodlake Lions Rodeo contest is held annually to select a young lady who will serve throughout the year as a positive role model representing the Woodlake Lions Club and the Woodlake Lions Rodeo at professional rodeos throughout California, and at local events within the community of Woodlake and Tulare County.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- Willing and able to fulfill all of the "queen's responsibilities" during her reign
- Single, never married, without children, and have not had any children previously
- Never previously held the title of Miss Woodlake Lions Rodeo
- A minimum of 16 years old, but not older than 24 years of age as of the date of the initial orientation meeting

The Woodlake Lions Rodeo Queen Committee works with the contestants each year in the contest categories, preparing them not only for the Miss Woodlake Lions Rodeo competition, but for future contests at other rodeo associations.





BARRIER In timed events, a line at the front of the box that the contestant and his horse cannot cross until the steer or calf has a head start, usually marked with a rope and a flag so the timers can see it drop and start the clock.

BOX In a timed event, the area a horse and rider back into before they make a roping or steer wrestling run.

BREAKING THE BARRIER In the timed events, if the rider leaves the box too soon – failing to give the animal enough of a head start – he is assessed a 10-second penalty.

BRONC REIN A saddle bronc rider holds onto a bronc rein (also known as a hack rein) at a specific position that he determines based on the size and bucking habits of the horse he's about to ride; bronc riders often give each other advice about the length of rein a specific horse will perform best with, e.g., "Give him 3½ fingers."

BULLDOGGER A steer wrestler.

BULLFIGHTER An athlete who protects the bull rider after he dismounts or is bucked off, by distracting the bull and directing its attention to the exit gate, sometimes stepping between the bull and the bull rider.

COVER In the roughstock events, staying on for at least the minimum time, eight seconds: "He covered all three broncs he rode last weekend."

CROSSFIRE PENALTY In team roping, if the header doesn't change the direction of the steer before the heeler catches, the run is disqualified.

DALLY In team roping, each roper, after throwing his loop, wraps the loose rope around his saddle horn (dallies) and the two ropers move their horses to face each other, pulling the ropes taut to stop the clock.

DRAW Each roughstock competitor who enters a PRCA rodeo is assigned a specific bucking horse or bull and each timed event contestant is assigned a specific calf or steer in their events. This is conducted by a random draw before each rodeo performance.

DROP In roughstock events, the way a bucking horse or bull may lower its front end suddenly while kicking out in back, creating a more difficult ride; in timed events, the way a calf or steer may lower its head to avoid a catch.

FLANKMAN A cowboy or cowgirl who works in the bucking chutes, adjusting the flank strap around the animal before the ride. The best flankmen are familiar with each individual animal and know exactly how much flank to give each animal to encourage optimal bucking.

FLANK STRAP A soft sheepskin- or Neoprene-lined strap placed in the area where a human's belt would go, it encourages the animal to kick out behind itself rather than rear up, which provides a safer, showier ride.

Common Rodeo Terms

HAZER In steer wrestling, the cowboy who rides on the right side of the steer from the contestant to make sure the steer runs straight.

HODEY The knot that a cowboy uses to finish tying the calf's legs together in tie-down roping.

HUNG UP When a bull rider or bareback rider cannot remove his hand from the rope or handle before he dismounts or is thrown off the bull's or horse's back, his hand is "hung up" – a dangerous situation – and the pickup men or bullfighters will move in to help dislodge his hand so he can get clear of the animal.

JUDGES As in other sports, trained PRCA judges ensure that all participants follow PRCA rules; they determine times for runs in the timed events and scores for rides in the roughstock events; record penalties for any infractions of the rules; and inspect the arena, chutes and livestock before each competition.

LEFT (OR RIGHT) DELIVERY Many bucking animals prefer to stand in the chute facing a particular direction, so they can leave the chute in the direction they prefer.

MARK-OUT In the bareback and saddle bronc riding, a cowboy's feet must be above the point of the horse's shoulders on the first jump out of the chute until the horse's front feet hit the ground – if so, he "marked the horse out," but if not, he "missed him out" and the ride is disqualified.

NOD In the roughstock events, a cowboy nods when he is ready for the gateman to open the gate and the ride to begin. In the timed events, a cowboy nods when he is ready for the calf or steer to be released from the chute and get its head start.

PENALTY In timed events, common penalties include 10 seconds for breaking the barrier; in team roping, five seconds for a one-hind-leg catch; and in barrel racing, five seconds for knocking over a barrel.

PERMIT HOLDER A PRCA contestant who has not yet won his first \$1,000 at PRCA rodeos, which enables him to apply to become a card-holding member of the organization.

PIGGIN' STRING In tie-down roping, the small rope used to tie a calf's legs together.

PICKUP MEN OR WOMEN Two mounted cowboys/cowgirls who help riders dismount, release a bucking horse's soft flank strap, and directing bucking horses and bulls to the exit gate after a ride.

PRCA The Woodlake Lions Rodeo is a sanctioned professional rodeo by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA), and is part of the California Circuit.

RANK An adjective used to describe especially challenging roughstock.

RERIDE If a cowboy's score is affected by equipment failure or a horse or bull that doesn't buck to performance specifications, the judges may offer the cowboy a clean-slate chance on a different horse or bull.

RIGGIN' A suitcase-style handhold customized to a rider's grip and attached to a molded piece of leather that is cinched, with a pad, around the horse's girth.

ROPES The correct term is rope, not lasso, lariat or riata; most ropes used in professional rodeo timed events are made of strong yet flexible braided materials such as nylon/poly blends, and a cowboy may change his rope selection depending on the weather and the cattle; bull ropes and bronc reins are often made of sisal or poly blends.

ROUGHSTOCK The bucking horses and bulls used in bareback riding, saddle bronc riding and bull riding, bred and raised for the job. They are born to buck!

SLACK Excess entries at some rodeos may be scheduled for preliminary (slack) competition, held after the Saturday rodeo performance at the Woodlake Lions Rodeo.

SPURS The spurs used in PRCA rodeos have dulled rowels that do not penetrate the animals' skin, which is several times thicker than human skin. Locked rowels are not allowed.

TRY A noun used for both cowboys and livestock, denoting grit, determination, fitness, stamina and resilience: "Give that cowboy a hand – he had a lot of try."

TURN OUT A cowboy may turn out of a rodeo if, for example, he has a scheduling conflict; this is different from "doctor-releasing" due to injury.



Bull Riding

ABOUT THE EVENT: Bull riding is rodeo's most dangerous event, and keeps rodeo fans on the edge of their seats! In the chute, the bull rider settles on the bull's back, wraps his braided rope around the bull, then loops the rope around his hand and back into his palm so he can grip it tightly. When he nods, the chute gate is opened and the bull jumps out of the chute to start an eight-second ride of spinning, twisting and jumping. Unlike the two bronc events, the cowboy does not have to mark-out on the bull, as it is more strategic to sit forward on the bull rather than leaned back. The cowboys successfully "covers" his bull for a score if he does not get bucked off or touch the equipment or bull with his free hand.

After the cowboy jumps off the bull at the end of his 8-second ride or is bucked off, bullfighters (also referred to as the cowboy protectors) will put themselves between the bull and the cowboy. They take the hits from the bulls so the bull riders have a chance to jump to their feet and get to safety.

Rodeo Events: Roughstock

Bareback Riding



ABOUT THE EVENT: Bareback riding is one of the most physically demanding events in rodeo! Just like the event name, the cowboy climbs aboard a bucking horse bareback, with only his own "riggin" to hold onto. As the horse comes out of the chute, the cowboy's heels must be at the horse's point of shoulders, known as "marking out." He holds his feet up at least through the horse's first jump out of the chute, and then begins the spurring action... spurring the horse on each jump, matching the horse's rhythm and showing control, rather than flopping around. The more spurring action and timed out rhythm from the cowboy and the more twists and turns of the horse, means a higher score!

Saddle Bronc Riding




ABOUT THE EVENT: Saddle bronc riding is called rodeo's "classic" event, as its traditionally known as the original event of the sport of rodeo.

Saddle bronc riders use a specialized saddle, designed with no horn and with the stirrups set forward. In the chute, the cowboy adjusts his grip on the rein, a six-foot braided rope. When the gate opens, the cowboy's boots must be at the point of the horse's shoulder to "mark-out." After the horse's first jump out of the chute, the spurring action begins, with long, smooth strokes in sync with the horse's jumps – legs straight when the bronc comes down, and back toward the back of the saddle at the top of the horse's jump.



Pickup Men & Women:

Pickup men and women are a vital part of roughstock events. In Bareback and Saddle Bronc Riding, they ride up alongside the bucking horses after the 8-second ride to help the cowboys safely dismount. They then release the flank straps, and lead the horses to the exit gate. In Bull Riding, the bullfighters are on deck to protect the cowboys from the bulls after their dismount, but the pickup crew still has the role of moving the bulls out of the arena before the next rider.







Team Roping

ABOUT THE EVENT: Team roping is a partner event, with one header and one heeler, who move in coordination. They and their horses start in the box, with the header starting from the left-hand box, and the heeler starting from the right-hand. When the header nods, the chute gate opens and the steer gets a head start. The header throws the first loop, which must catch in one of three legal catches – around the head, around the horns, or half a head. The steer's horns are protected by a horn wrap. Once the header catches the steer, he dallies (wraps) his rope around his saddle horn, and turns left, changing the direction of the steer. This move pulls the rope taut, and gives the heeler the opportunity to catch both of the



steer's hind legs with his own rope. After the catch, the heeler also dallies to stop the steer. If only one heel is caught, the team gets a five-second penalty. Time is called when the slack is tight in both ropes and both horses are facing the steer.

Rodeo Events: Timed Events

Steer Wrestling



ABOUT THE EVENT: Steer wrestlers are generally referred to as football's equivalent to a lineman. They'd have to be to wrestle a 500- to 600-pound steer. Steer wrestling demands coordination between two cowboys - the steer wrestler and his hazer – and their horses. The steer wrestler (also referred to as a bulldogger) backs his horse into the left-hand box, while his hazer backs into the righthand box. When the steer wrestler nods his head, the chute gate opens and the steer gets a head start. The hazer's role is the keep the steer running straight, setting it up for the steer wrestler to dismount his horse while moving at least 30 miles an hour, taking a hold of the steer's horns, and then digging his boot heels into the arena to slow down the steer. Once he has the steer stopped, he wrestles the steer onto its side. Time is called when all four legs are pointed in the same direction.



Tie-Down Roping




ABOUT THE EVENT: Tie-down rope horses have the reputation for being the most athletic of the horses in rodeo, and when you watch them at work in the rodeo arena, you'll see why. The tie-down roping event begins when the tie-down roper and his horse back into the lefthand box, the cowboy carrying a rope in one hand and a "pigging string" in his mouth. When the cowboy nods, the chute opens and the calf gets a head start. The cowboy throws a loop over its head, and his horse stops and pulls the rope taut while the cowboy steps off, all in one simultaneous moment. The cowboy then makes his way down the rope while the horse keeps the slack in the rope tight, flanks the calf and lays it on the ground, and uses the pigging string to tie any of its three legs together. With two loops and hooey, time is called when the cowboy puts his hands in the air to show he is finished. The cowboy remounts the horse and moves the horse toward the calf to give the rope slack. The calf's legs must stay tied for six seconds once the cowboy remounts his horse, and then his time is deemed a qualified run.

Rodeo Events: Timed Events

Barrel Racing

ABOUT THE EVENT: Barrel racing is a race against time as cowgirls run in a cloverleaf pattern around three barrels set up in the arena. In the pattern, the rider can choose to

make one left turn and two right turns, or one right turn and two left turns. Time begins when the horse and rider cross a start line, generally an electronic eye, and stops when they come back across the same line. The horses are generally so fast, it







Stanley "Ray Ray" Taylor

Stanley "Ray Ray" Taylor, Jr. grew up in Compton, California, and has put years of blood, sweat and hard work into becoming the professional bullfighter he is today. Stanley's parents raised him around horses and cattle on one of the two horse farms in the city. Like most future bull riders, he started riding steers as a child, and swung a leg over his first bull during his sophomore year of high school. Stanley continued riding bulls throughout his teens and early 20s, all while balancing his high school and college football career, and working for Flying U Rodeo in Marysville, California.

With his athletic talents, Stanley made the move from bull rider to cowboy protector in 2017, and has been a PRCA bullfighter since 2018. He fights bulls for professional rodeos along the West Coast and Utah, at bull riding schools and jackpots throughout California, Nevada and Oregon, and made appearances in the Bullfighters Only's (BFO) freestyle bullfighting ring early in his career. He has been selected twice by the PRCA's California Circuit bull riders to be their cowboy protector at the Circuit Finals.

When Stanley isn't in the rodeo arena putting himself between a cowboy and a bull, he also works as a cowboy stuntman in commercials and television shows such as CW's Walker.

Warren Enz

The rodeo roots for Warren Enz run deep as he carries on his family's tradition of rodeo and bullfighting. His great grandmother, Bernadette Cabral, was rodeo's first woman bullfighter. Warren began his own bullfighting career when he was 16 at open rodeos and jackpots. About the Livestock

Livestock Welfare

A few facts about the welfare of rodeo livestock:

- The average bucking horse or bucking bull works less than 10 minutes a year in the arena.
- Rodeo livestock have long and healthy lives. Many
 of today's top bucking horses are 20 years of age or
 older, and many bulls are active buckers at age 15.
 Veterinarians attribute these long and healthy life spans
 to good care, quality feed, and adequate exercise.
- PRCA rules prohibit the use of sharpened spurs or other implements that could harm an animal.
- Any PRCA member caught using unnecessary roughness or abusing an animal may be immediately disqualified from the rodeo and fined. This holds true whether it is in the competitive arena or elsewhere on the rodeo grounds.

PRORODEO

- Weight limitations are set for both calves (between 220-280 pounds) and steers (between 450-650 pounds).
- Both bulls and horses have natural bucking tendencies, which is where the term "Born to Buck" stems from. Many do while playing
 - together in pastures, just as horses naturally race each other. What makes an animal a candidate for rodeo livestock is the absolute determination to buck if something is on its back. They are bred to buck, just like the bloodlines they descend from.
- PRCA rules require flank straps to be lined with fleece or neoprene in the flank area (similar to a human waist). Flank straps are tightened just enough to encourage the animal to kick behind itself instead of hopping around the arena. Over-tightening would result in the animal's refusal to move at all, much less buck. Flank straps do not contact an animal's genitals, and they do not cause the animal to buck. Their natural instinct is what causes them to buck.




VETERINARY CARE: PACIFIC CREST EQUINE

A veterinarian is always on-site for all PRCA-sanctioned rodeos. They inspect and evaluate all livestock for illness, weight, eyesight and injury prior to the rodeo, and no animals that are sore, lame, sick or injured participate in the event.


The volunteer veterinarian on-site providing health care for the livestock at the 2024 Woodlake Lions Rodeo is Dr. Taryn Holliday from Pacific Crest Equine.

Dr. Holliday grew up on a ranch just outside of Barstow, California. She has owned and competed on horses her entire life, and enjoys team roping and barrel racing. Dr. Holliday attended Colorado State University where she was on



the rodeo team, worked at the equine reproduction lab, and graduated with a bachelor's in Microbiology. She then attended vet school at Western University of Health Sciences. She has been part of the Pacific Crest Equine team since she began her career as a veterinarian in 2018.

The Woodlake Lions Rodeo officially kicks off with the "High-Five Rodeo" on the Friday morning before each Mother's Day weekend. Woodlake Lions Rodeo began the "High-Five Rodeo" program in 2019 to give developmentally-disabled individuals an opportunity to participate in modified versions of rodeo events and learn some of the every day skills of the cowboy life.

Participants are paired up with real-life cowboys and cowgirls, including members/rodeo contestants of the California Junior Cowboys Association, Miss Woodlake Lions Rodeo and her court, and other rodeo performers and key personnel involved in the production of our rodeo. These volunteers guide the High-Five Rodeo "contestants" through rodeo-related stations in the arena and give them special preview performances of the Woodlake Lions Rodeo's specialty acts.

High-Five Rodeo participants compete in a stick-horse barrel race, learn how to rope a dummy steer head, ride a horse through a pole bending course, enjoy petting some livestock, and learn some of the rules of rodeo. The Tulare County Sheriff's Department K-9 Unit and local Cal-Fire firefighters also gave demonstrations in 2023.

It's an absolutely amazing day for not only the participants, but also the volunteers. It is truly an honor to be able to share our sport and western traditions with the individuals who attend.
